Turn-taking

When you're playing or having a conversation with your child, show them how to take turns.



Turn-taking helps your child learn to share attention with another person and learn how conversations work.



Cook together



- Use activities such as meal preparation to teach children about taking turns.

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Did you know...

Interaction is a two-way process; children need to practice their turn-taking, this helps them to know when it is appropriate to respond.

Taking turns helps your child to learn the rhythm of conversation and develop their social skills.

Children learn to stay focused on an activity and to listen and wait.

Turn-taking develops long before children can talk.

You can help children take turns in your normal routines, for example when playing a game, role playing with a favourite toy or using equipment like slides or swings.

Make it meaningful



- Take turns passing a toy back and forth.
- Exchange toys, balls, or cars. Take turns in rolling the ball or car to each other.
