
Early Years Communication and Language Development Service – Blank Language for Learning Model and Story Telling

What is the Blank Language for Learning model?

 It is a framework which considers different levels of questioning and a child's understanding ability. The Blank Language Scheme was developed in the 1970s by Australian educationalists (Blank, Rose & Berlin, 1978). They studied the language of the classroom and identified four levels of questioning graded in order of abstractness. The model breaks down a quite complex area of language processing into four stages. It is a helpful model to use when considering a child's ability to understand instructions/questions and when differentiating activities.



Language for Learning Model

• In terms of typical development, 60% of 3 year olds understand level 1 and level 2 questions and 65% of 5 year olds understand level 3 and level 4 questions.

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
